BIOGRAPHICAL INFORMATION

Alpheus Hyatt was born on April 5, 1838 in Washington DC. In 1857, he attended Yale for a year before transferring to Harvard to study under Louis Agassiz. Graduating in 1862, he served in the Civil War before becoming a professor of zoology and paleontology at the Massachusetts Institute of Technology. In 1877, he joined Boston University as a professor of biology.

Professor Hyatt organized a Teachers' School of Science which taught over twelve hundred teachers from 1870-1890. From 1880 to 1886, he also maintained a marine laboratory at Annisquam, Massachusetts with the assistance of the Women's Education Association of Boston and the Boston Society of Natural History. From this laboratory grew the MBL. Alpheus Hyatt served as the first president of the MBL Corporation from 1888-89.

His research focused on fossil cephalopods as well as the evolution and genetic relationships of sponges, bryozoans, bivalves, gastropods, and insects. He was one of the main proponents of the "neo-Lamarckian" school of evolution. A noted teacher as well, Alpheus Hyatt died in 1902 in Cambridge Massachusetts.
